RULES FOR EXHIBITORS! PLEASE READ CAREFULLY!

- 1** If a measurement is quoted in the class description, do not forget to check it, because the judges will.
- 2** **Junior classes** must be completed without the help of adults. Their age (on the 29th September 2024) must be clearly shown on the entry form.
- 3** **Novice classes.** In this schedule a novice is deemed to be someone who has not won a prize in the section being entered at this Show.

All entries are anonymous to the judges.

Do not take offence at their comments - they are intended to be constructive.

CLASSES

ALCOHOLIC & NON-ALCOHOLIC DRINKS

No trade names on bottles – Kilner allowed

- 1 Bottle of wine, sweet or dry, red, white or rose
- 2 Bottle of cordial (non-alcoholic) – name to be stated on bottle
- 3 Bottle of homemade sloe gin – clear glass bottle
- 4 Bottle of homemade flavoured spirit (not sloe) – clear glass bottle

EGGS

(The judge reserves the right to break the eggs)

- 13 Pot of marmalade from fresh fruit

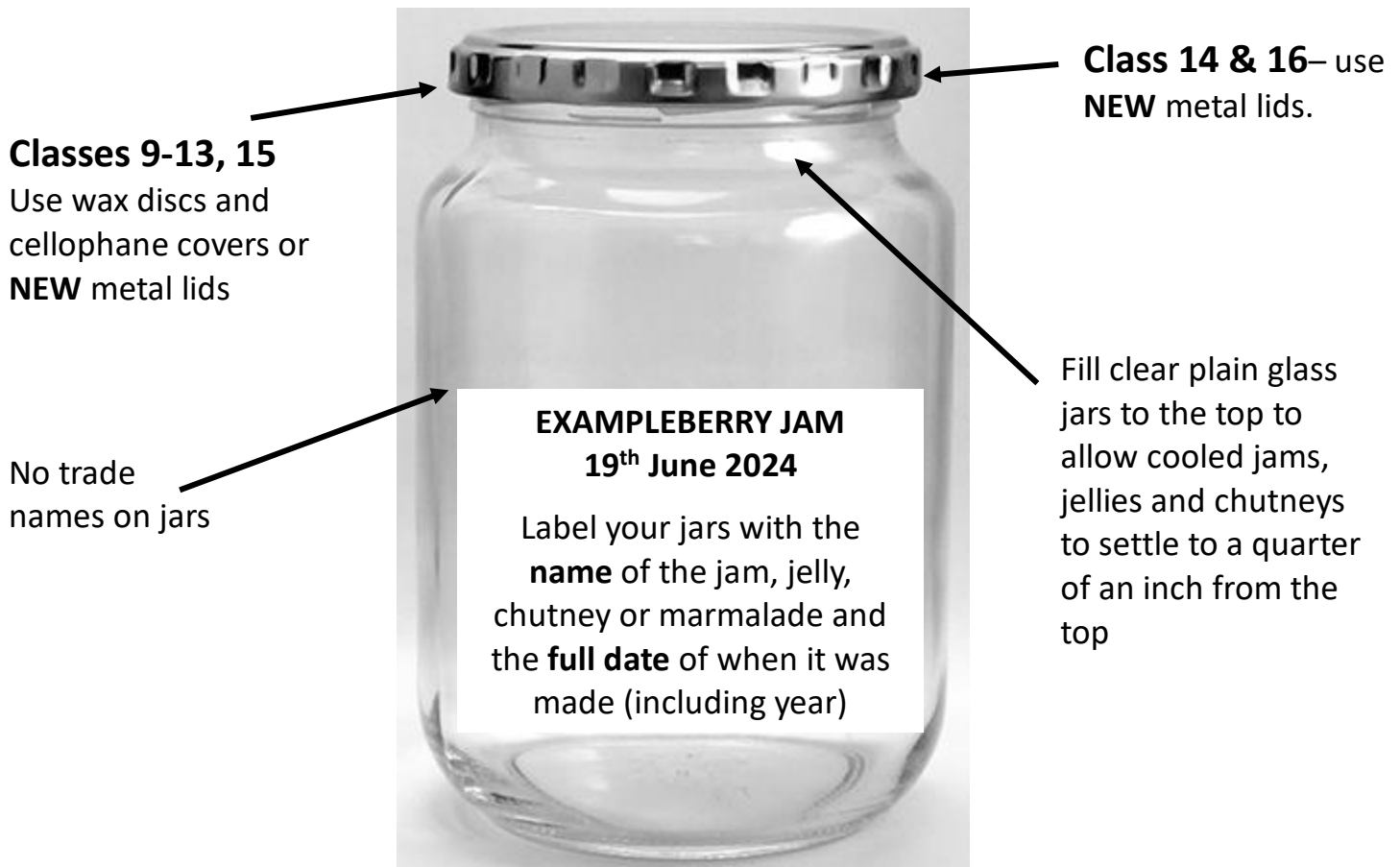

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

- Fill clear plain glass jars (no trade names on jars – Kilner allowed) to the top to allow cooled jams, jellies and chutneys to settle to a quarter of an inch from the top.
- Names of preserve and date to show on jar label.
- **Classes 9-13, 15** - use wax discs and cellophane covers, or new metal lids
- **Class 14 & 16** - USE NEW METAL LIDS. **(These can be ordered through any 'Country Market' (W I)) Entries with reused lids will not be judged!**

RECIPES

VICTORIA SANDWICH 18cm (7") diameter approx.

Do not sugar top. Do not turn out so wire tray marks are visible on the top.

175g (6oz) self-raising flour
175g (6oz) caster sugar

175g (6oz) butter or margarine
3 free-range eggs

PLAIN SCONES

Roll out to approx. 2.5cm (1") thick, cut into rounds with 6cm/2.3in cutter. Milk wash top

450g (1lb) Self-raising flour
2 level tsp baking powder
50g (1¾ oz) caster sugar

100g (3½oz) butter, softened, cut into pieces
2 free-range eggs
a little milk

VEGETABLES
